On January 2, 2025, the fair value methodology used to value debt held by the Artisan Global Unconstrained Strategy was changed from using bid pricing to using the midpoint between the bid and ask price. The change resulted in a one-time increase of less than 0.35% in the composite performance for Artisan Global Unconstrained Strategy.

The portfolio exposures presented exclude US Treasurys, US dollars and US dollar-denominated derivatives and cash equivalents, unless otherwise noted. In aggregate, these instruments make up a material portion of the portfolio's exposures and may be impactful to the portfolio's return, but are typically utilized for liquidity management and reflect negative exposures due to currency offsets when funding non-US positions. Hard currencies are defined by the investment team to include currencies of developed market countries, including US dollars, euros, British pounds and Japanese yen, among others.

Unless otherwise indicated, the portfolio data and performance source is Artisan Partners and information is as of the date shown in the upper right hand corner and is subject to change. Where applicable, portfolio statistics include accrued interest, and exposure percentages are based on total net assets. Totals may not sum to 100% due to rounding, derivative exposures, unsettled transactions and other factors. Notional value adjusts for derivatives' exposures to the market value of a contract's underlying security, rather than the market value of the contract itself, and represents an approximation of the portfolio's economic and risk exposures at a point in time. Delta measures the sensitivity of a derivative contract to changes in price of its underlying security; the derivatives contract's value may be overstated or understated without delta-adjustment.

Net-of-fees composite returns were calculated using the highest model investment advisory fees applicable to portfolios within the composite. Fees may be higher for certain pooled vehicles and the composite may include accounts with performance-based fees. All performance results are net of commissions and transaction costs, and have been presented gross and net of investment advisory fees. Dividend income is recorded net of foreign withholding taxes on ex-dividend date or as soon after the ex-dividend date as the information becomes available to Artisan Partners. Interest income is recorded on the accrual basis. Performance results for the Index include reinvested dividends and are presented net of foreign withholding taxes but, unlike the portfolio's returns, do not reflect the payment of sales commissions or other expenses incurred in the purchase or sale of the securities included in the indices.

The ICE BofA 3-Month U.S. Treasury Bill Index is an unmanaged index that comprises a single U.S. Treasury issue with approximately three months to final maturity, purchased at the beginning of each month and held for one full month. The index(es) are unmanaged; include net reinvested dividends; do not reflect fees or expenses; and are not available for direct investment.

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Effective Duration (option-adjusted duration) measures the portfolio's sensitivity of the price (the value of principal) of fixed income securities to changes in interest rates, adjusted to account for embedded options. Spread Duration measures a portfolio's sensitivity to price movements (the value of principal) for fixed income securities relative to changes in each security's credit spread (yield difference between a benchmark, typically a treasury yield curve). Credit Rating Composition is the portfolio's proportion of investment grade (IG), below investment grade (High Yield; HY) and not rated securities by market value weight determined by Artisan Partners. Not Rated includes unrated positions and derivatives. IG includes cash and equivalents. Artisan utilizes available ratings from Moody's, S&P and Fitch assigned to each relevant position held in the portfolio, taking the middle rating if the security is rated by all three agencies, the lower rating if the security is rated by two of the three, and the sole rating if the security is rated by one of the three agencies. Credit Rating Composition is subject to change and does not ensure the stability or safety of the entire portfolio. Detailed portfolio rating exposures are available upon request. Yield to Worst (YTW) is the portfolio's weighted-average lowest potential yield that can be received on a bond without the issuer actually defaulting.

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
